'FROM THE TOUCHLINE' by J. Diack.

After an even first half the first XV found good form during the second half to comfortably defeat West Torrens 17 - 6 last week.

Collegians opened strongly and taking advantage of some good loose defence by the opposition, forced the play to within ten yards of the goal line where, from a resulting ruck, Guerin grabbed the ball and scored Collegian's first try. Next a penalty kick from just inside Torren's ten yard line was awarded and Forbes booted strongly to notch three more points.

From then until half-time Torrens tightened their play considerably and looked a better team. Always ready to snap up a loose ball, once they gained possession and started to run they proved extremely hard to stop and it was only the failure of their wingers to take passes cleanly that prevented them from scoring three or four relatively easy tries. Their inside backs eluded our tackles many times (too often, I might add...) Collegians won more than half of the set play throughout the match with our pack working hard in both attack and defence and with the backs working similarly. The opposition scored one try before half-time.

Torrens looked dangerous early in the second half but our lines of defence were equal to the task keeping the opposition at bay while they were inside our twenty-five. (I would say that our defence within the 25 was much stronger than our mid-field defence.) A long kick found touch a yard inside Torren's goal line, Forbes won the ball away from the man at the back of the line-out and scored and converted Collegians' second try. Torrens replied quickly

with a dash down the line resulting in a try. It was not until fairly late in the match that Collegians gained a commanding lead and this came from an excellent backline movement which featured Desfontaines backing up the winger and scoring a fine try. Good play. The same player scored again when he took a pass to culminate a good rush by the team.

Best players: Desfontaines, Dutton and Stewart with Forbes, Burgess Turner and Slade playing well.

SECOND DIVISION

Again, an excellent fighting pack but nothing co-ordinated behind the half-back. As before, no really satisfactory five-eighth was on duty, so the three-quarters seldom got clean ball and room to move at the same time.

A feature of the match was the number of penalties awarded against us - mainly for line-out troubles. On such occasions it is immaterial whether the referee is right or wrong - he's the man with the whistle! We must find out who is at fault and in what way and brief him so as to avoid further loss of points. In this game we scored three tries to two but lost by 11 points. Full-backs of the calibre of Burnside's Clive Buttery just lap up this sort of generosity.

After Burnside had opened up the scoring with a fine penalty from mid-field (0 - 3) a well-placed short punt by Paul Bayley set up an attacking position in which the opposing full-back was caught in possession - the first of several times - and an extremely mobile Tony Maxwell picked up well in the loose to make it 3 - 3. Then came the best try of the match. Ian Edwards made a break and a long run from his own 25, found Geno who made further ground, stayed with him for his return pass and then sent Maxwell over. This really fine piece of play gave us a lead of 6 - 3.

The score was soon levelled by Buttery with another splendid penalty from 45 yards, (6 - 6), a feat which he repeated from 40 yards out a little later (6 - 9). Burnside went further ahead with a try that should never have been scored. In a determined attack down their left wing three or four less-than-half-hearted tackles were brushed aside to allow them to score in the corner. We shall always be beaten - and deserve to be beaten - when defence is as bad as this.

After half-time Maxwell's third try rounded off good combined work between Goodwin, and C. Davidson. (9-12). Collegians followed this with a long sustained attack involving Manson, Wilson, Bayley, Goodwin and Davidson and an apparent score by the last-named was ruled to be a touch in-goal. In fact Burnside a little luckily scored next when a fine penalty kick bounced on top of the cross bar (9 - 15). Geno came to five-eighth when Bayley was hurt, but the final score went to Burnside when their outside center profited by mishandling by our mid-field players. Buttery made no mistake and the match ended at 9 - 20.

The fact that Maxwell incurred a number of penalties should be related to my earlier remarks on this subject. In addition to his 3 tries, it was good to see him dropping back into mid-field defence when the ball had been lost in a scrum. This really means being a fit player - what about it, some of you non-trainers?

Ian Edwards again played a fine Captains game and was well supported by Manson, Wilson and McQueen. Behind the pack Goodwin played well whilst in the backs (starved of chances) Geno and Davidson had some good moments, usually of their own making.
