## 1st GRADE

The first half started and continued in a semi-physical fashion with both teams kicking from 5/8. Collegians kicked badly and did not find touch too often. The first scoring chance went to Collegians after 15 minutes, with Bruce Ward narrowly missing a penalty attempt from 30 metres out. Bruce had two further attempts from further out both of which went wide, with Phil Bruce also having two long range attempts. At the 23 minute mark a quick tap was taken from 10 metres out, which caught Collegians sleeping, Aspro scored and Rata converted for the half time score of 6-0.

Bob Inskip retired hurt at half time, having been limping since the first five minutes. Kev Waldren was replaced by Tony Sheehan ten minutes into the second half. At the fifteen minute mark a loose scrum was won by Collegians and for only the second time in the game we were in Brightons 22. Kim Dow moved the ball to Sean Beaton who put Ross de la Mott away. Ross moved beautifully and put Greg Pearse, who was backing up well, in for the try. Mick Byrne missed the conversion. Minutes later Sean Beaton again made a good break and Ross, receiving the ball, was tackled high. From 30 metres out Bruce Ward kicked the penalty for a 7-6 lead. Collegians had now come to life and moved the ball along the backs for the first time in the game. A 22 metre drop-out was stopped by Richard Waddicor, and caught Phil Bruce off-side. Ward hit the post with the penalty attempt. Continued pressure resulted in a scrum on Brightons line which was won by Richard Waddicor and Greg went over for his second try. Score was now 11-6. Brighton came back strongly using the backs, and Mick Byrne had to leave the field after an attempted tackle, and was replaced by Denzil Church 30 minutes into the second half. The game then became very fast and furious with play being allowed to flow by ref. Max Turrel. Collegians tackelling led by Sean Beaton and the two breakaways, Den Hay and Biggles kept us intact. Sean surprised himself with good tactical kicking both relieving pressure and gaining ground. Good pressure again forced an error by Brighton; moving the ball along their back line, a strong tackle by Tony Sheehan resulted in him taking the ball and putting the ever supporting Den Hay in for a try, with two minutes of time on to go. The final score was 15-6 to Collegians which was a well deserved score after a much better performance by the red and blue in the second forty minutes of play.

2nd GRADE

Tropical conditions prevailed making for many spilt gin and tonics. The rugby was not unlike a seven-a-side chess game. However for a team which had never run together they looked like a team which had never run together, or even by themselves. ## 1st GRADE

With the wind against us at the start, Port Adelaide opened the scoring with a penalty goal in the first four minutes of the game. They followed this up with a try against the flow of play in another few minutes to lead by 7 points. Bruce Ward opened our credit sheet with a good kicked penalty. 7-3. Owen Clarke, diving over a ruck, gave Port's their next chance at scoring, but the kick dropped short. Port's continued to attack, but a good clearing kick by Denzil relieved the pressure. Play continued just inside our half, with Beaton being missed at five-eight. A very good run by Guy Lithgow from a well won ruck, and good handling by the backs, ended in a try to Guy after he chipped the ball over the opposition winger. 7-7. Bruce's attempted conversion went wide. From the kickoff P.A. attacked

our line. A penalty to us, saw Denzil swing the ball away from the forwards, to the P.A. winger. He was only just caught. Kim Dow, offside at the lineout, saw Port kick another long ball through for a penalty. 10-7 down. A couple of lineouts saw play oscillating across the field, around the centre line. Our fullback, under a bit of pressure, kicked downfield. Good kicker he is, because the ball went straight to their fullback. Coincidentally, I was just getting to my feet (no, I'm not unfit, I'd been at the bottom of a maul) and I was about 6-7 metres away from the fullback. Now I know I can't be within 10 metres of an opponent waiting to play the ball. But I was already there, see, so I stood still - doing no harm to anyone. 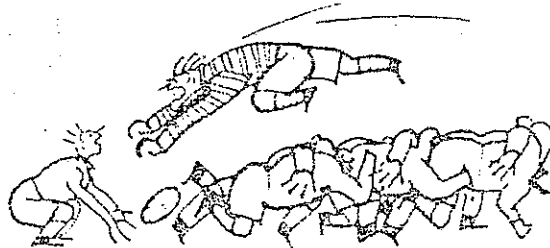
"Right on", said Peter. "You must understand that if you are within 10 metres of an opponent waiting to receive the ball you MUST RETIRE to 10 metres".

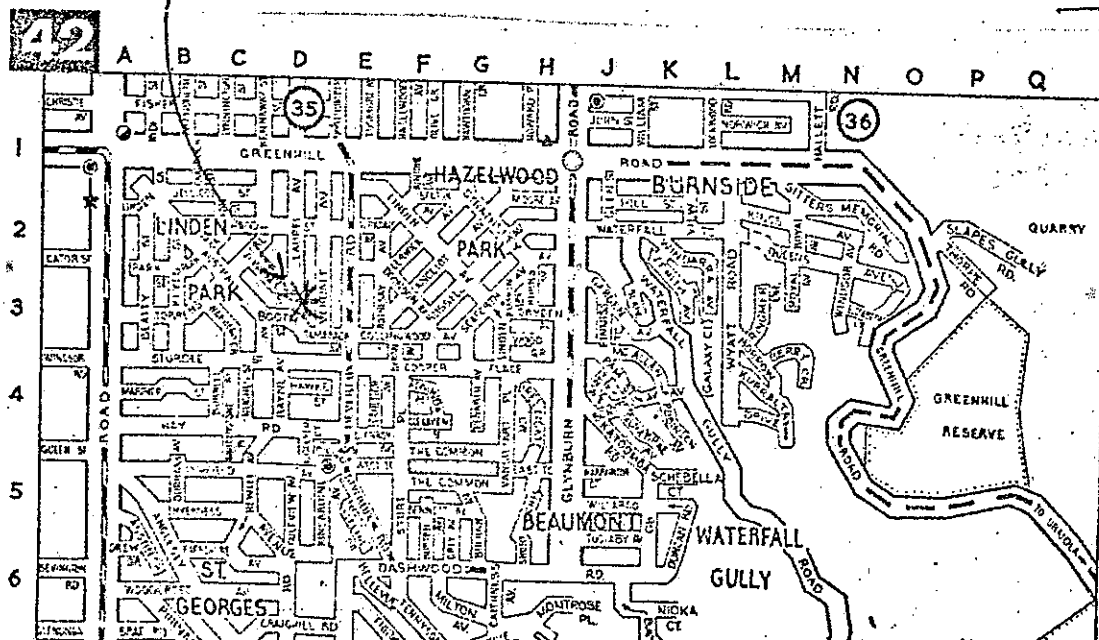
