Dear Sir,

I am pleased to enclose herewith my Audit Report on your Club's Accounts for year ended 30th September, 1985. The Report has been qualified on three grounds which I hope you will agree are reasonable under the circumstances.

I have also taken this opportunity to set out a number of matters which I hope will be of interest and some assistance to you and your Committee in conducting the affairs of the Club during the current year.

Bar Trading Operations

I recommend that all cash register tapes are retained and cleared by someone not connected with bar duties. The present system is not adequate and it is my opinion that a Club of this size and calibre should take steps to conduct bar operations in a more conventional fashion.

Lack of control in this area is of some concern to an Auditor. I have, however, accepted the situation for this past year, encouraged by the fact that gross profit margins have, in fact, increased from 34.5% [1984] to 36.7% [1985].

Perhaps it might be just as well to set down some sort of predetermined standard [acceptable to the Club as a whole] and measure performance accordingly.

Goods Received & Services Rendered

Inwards invoices should, without exception, bear the signature of some authorised person acknowledging the receipt of all goods and services. No accounts should be passed for payment without assurance that this area has been attended to.

The point is perhaps that if certain standard procedures are adopted, efficiency is generally improved.

<u>Receipts</u>

It is also my opinion that receipts should be made out for all cash received [donations subscriptions, etc.]. Receipts need not necessarily be issued, of course, but the general accounting control is obviously improved.

Subscriptions Received

I have accepted the figure produced for receipts on a cash received basis under the circumstances. In future years it would be an improvement to see working papers relating to subscription arrears and subscription advances [if any!].

Finally, it may be necessary for you to have a look at the new Associations Incorporation Act 1985 [especially Sec. 51] re returns that will be necessary in the future.

I do wish you and your Committee a most successful year and I look forward to attending your Annual General Meeting with subscription in hand.

AUDITORS REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF

OLD COLLEGIANS RUGBY UNION FOOTBALL CLUB INC.

- 1. I report that I have audited the accompanying accounts being the Balance Sheet as at the 30th September, 1985, Statement of Income & Expenditure for the year ended 30th September, 1985, and notes 1 7 inclusive attached thereto.
- 2. [1] As an audit procedure, it was not practicable to extend my examination of fund raisings and raffles and competitions beyond the accounting for amounts received as shown by the books and records of the Club.
 - [2] No Auditor was appointed for year ended 30th September, 1984. Prior year comparative figures have not been audited by me.
 - [3] Clubhouse premises constitute leasehold improvements. In accordance with Accounting Standard AAS4 issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants in Australia "the cost of improvements to or on a leasehold property should be written off, by means of depreciation charges over the unexpired period of the lease or estimated useful lives of the improvements whichever is the shorter".

Until the final agreement of the terms of the proposed lease is settled, it is, in this case, not practicable to quantify the effect of this standard on the accounts.

3. Subject to the matters discussed in Paragraph 2, in my opinion, the attached accounts referred to in Paragraph 1 have been properly drawn up to give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Club at 30th September, 1985, and the results of its operations for the year ended on that date.

TO THE LICENSEE

The transitional provisions under the Liquor Licensing Act, 1985 exempted a licensee until 1 September 1985 from the requirements of Section 116, 117 and 120 provided that, until that date, the licensee complied with the corresponding requirements of the repealed Act.

It is now an offence, carrying a penalty of up to \$5,000, for non-compliance with these requirements.

Your attention is drawn to the relevant provisions of the Act and the Regulations of which are reproduced below.

Section 116

- "(1) A licensee (not being a licensee who holds only a limited licence) shall display, at or near the front entrance to the licensed premises, a notice in the prescribed form setting out -
 - (a) the name of the licensee:
 - (b) if the licensed premises are not managed by the licensee personally - the name of the manager;
 - (c) the class of the licence;

and

- (d) if the licence is a restaurant licence subject to the endorsement "B.Y.O." - an indication that the licence is subject to that endorsement.
- (2) A licensee who fails to comply with this section is guilty of an offence."

Regulation 11

"The notice to be displayed by a licensee pursuant to section 116 of the Act shall be painted or printed -

- in bold-faced letters of a height of at least 50 millimetres;
- (b) in clearly legible form; and
- in such a place, and subject to sufficient lighting, to make the notice conspicuous to and legible by any person passing or entering the front entrance to the licensed premises during authorized trading hours."

Section 117

- "(1) A licensee shall cause a copy of the licence, showing all conditions of, and endorsements on, the licence to be kept on the licensed premises at all times.
- (2) The licensee, or a manager of the business conducted in pursuance of the licence shall, if so required by an inspector or a member of the police force, produce the copy of the licence for inspection.
- (3) A person who fails, without reasonable excuse, to comply with subsection (1), or a requirement under subsection (2), is guilty of an offence."

- "(1) A licensee shall cause to be displayed in a prominent position in each part of the licensed premises to which access is permitted to minors by the licensee a notice in the prescribed form -
 - (a) stating -
 - (i) the minimum age at which liquor may be consumed in the licensed premises;
 - (ii) that persons suspected of being under the minimum age may be required to provide evidence of their age;
 - (iii) that minors are prohibited from obtaining or consuming liquor on the licensed premises;
 - (iv) the penalties for the unlawful obtaining or consumption of liquor on licensed premises by a minor;

and

- (b) including such other information as may be prescribed.
- (2) A licensee who fails to comply with this section is guilty of an offence."

Regulation 13

"The notice to be displayed pursuant to section 120 of the Act in each part of the licensed premises to which access is permitted to minors shall be in the form of the Sixth Schedule to these regulations, and shall be printed on paper of dimensions -

- (a) in the case of all parts of licensed premises the subject of a hotel licence or entertainment venue licence, or those parts of licensed premises the subject of any other licence and in respect of which parts consent has been given pursuant to section 113 of the Act - at least of those of international size A3 paper, in bold-faced letters of a height of at least 10 millimetres;
- (b) in any other case at least of those of international A4 paper, in bold-faced letters of a height of at least 5 millimetres."

Regulation 14

"The words of notices referred to in Regulations 13 shall be printed in a colour or colours contrasting with the background on which they are printed."

The Sixth Schedule is as follows:

CIRCULAR

Smoking is a major cause of ill-health in the community and steps to reduce the incidence of smoking, particularly among the young, are important preventive health measures.

I am writing to you to ensure that, as a seller of cigarettes and tobacco, you are aware of your legal responsibilities in respect of their sale to children.

Legislation recently passed by Parliament (The Tobacco Sales to Children (Prohibition) Act, 1984) continues to make it an offence to sell or supply tobacco products to persons under 16 years of age and also increases significantly the penalties. Tobacco products include cigarettes, cigars or other tobacco products intended for smoking. The penalty for breaching this prohibition is a fine of up to \$500 and the person who actually makes the sale commits the offence.

The prohibition applies both to the selling of tobacco products and to their supply including both giving or lending. Sale also includes sale by vending machine.

The Act requires retail vendors of tobacco products to display a warning stating that it is an offence to sell or supply tobacco products to persons under 16 years. A notice which is considered suitable for this purpose is enclosed for display in a position where it will be readily noticed by persons intending to purchase tobacco products. The penalty for not displaying a suitable warning is a fine of up to \$200.

As the retailers of cigarettes are faced with the task of restricting their sale to children, I seek your co-operation in enforcing this legislation and displaying this notice.

Subject: Repositioning of a training light at Tregenza Oval.

To enable night-time training at Old Collegians there exist several lighting fixtures around the ground including a pair of lights at a height of approximately 12 metres situated on the north and south corners of the club house.

The northern-most light was stolen and subsequently recovered but has not been refitted.

We request permission to move the siting of the light some 25 metres north of its former position (see diagram) and it to be positioned at the same height as previously.

This would give a better spread of light over the oval as the north-west corner is currently poorly lit.

This area is also naturally the driest part of the ground during wet weather and so its increased use would lessen the use and hence damage to the rest of the ground during poor conditions.

We propose a trench approximately 20 metres long and half a metre deep to take the cabling and the lighting support would be a 3" diameter post concreted in to a depth of approximately 1.6 metres.

We would be more than happy to consult with your building and parks and garden personnel to ensure that the lighting meets the required environmental and safety standards and to ensure there is no disruption to the underground services.



Match Program 1985 and SARU Development Fund

The following comments on the 1985 Match Program and our raising monies for the SARU Development Fund are in response to your circular dated 17th November 1984 and addressed to All Club Secretaries and Affiliated Bodies.

1. 1985 Match Program

OCRFC agrees with the general message in the submissions to the SARU by Messrs. Herde, Millar, Reilly and Wilson, viz. that the standard of rugby in S.A. could and should be improved, and that this improvement may be achieved by more competitive local competitions and through the promotion of juniors. OCRFC favours improving the overall standard of rugby, including the quality of rugby for players, with the consequence of an improved state side, rather than concentrating on improving the Etate side per se, at this stage. OCRFC also considers that the SARU Match Committee should look to the long-term interest of rugby when planning the 1985 season rather than to the short-term interest of Clubs. Consequently the number of teams in First Division should be reduced - each of the above submissions also referred to the need to improve the standard of rugby by developing a stronger First Division Competition than in the previous few years. To this end, OCRFC suggests the following type of competition program and requirements of Clubs.

1.1 Competition Program

Division I - six Clubs with a team in each of three Grades, say, Div. I - Grade 1, Div. I - Grade 2 and Div. I - Grade 3. Based on last year's results this Division for 1985 may include Brighton, Burnside, Old Collegians, Onkaparinga, Pt. Adelaide and University.

Division II - six Clubs with a team in each of two grades, say, Div. II - Grade 1 and Div. II - Grade 2. Based on last year's results this Division for 1985 may include Elizabeth, North Adelaide, Esalisbury, Southern Suburbs, West Torrens and Woodville.

Division III - this Division comprises (a) fourth teams of Division I Clubs, (b) third teams of Division II Clubs and (c) teams of special interest Clubs, e.g. Roseworthy. Based on last year's results this Division for 1985 could include teams from Brighton, Burnside, Old Collegians and, perhaps, veteran teams.

In the short-term, there may be some problems fielding sufficient teams in Division III, however, this problem is not considered to differ markedly from similar problems, resulting in forfeits, in the comparable Division IV of previous years - though, the playing of Division III games on different grounds than Div. I or II games (see 1.5) may create problems in some Clubs where players have to play more than one game on a Saturday to make up the required number of players for the Clubs teams.

1.2 Pre-requisites of Division I & II Clubs.

In addition to fielding a team in each Grade of Division I, Division I Clubs must also have a direct input into the promotion of junior rugby in SA. The required input may differ for district Clubs compared to non-district Clubs e.g. Old Collegians and University. District Clubs could be required to field junior teams, as proposed in Wilson's submission, and non-district Clubs could be required to assist with juniors, either through fielding junior teams, especially U/18 and/or U/16, or through assisting with rugby in primary and/or secondary schools. Division I Clubs may also field a team in Division III.

Division II Clubs must field a team in each Grade in Division II and may also field a team in Division III. Clubs in this Division should be encouraged by the SARU (e.g. through the proposed SARU Development Fund) to promote juniors and to field a team in Division III - the promotion of juniors and fielding a third team will provide Division II Clubs with an opportunity to be promoted to Division I (see 1.3).

1.3 Promotion/Relegation of Clubs

Division II Clubs, which gain the qualities required of a Division I Club, i.e. at least three teams of sufficient reliability and standard and the necessary involvement in junior rugby, may be invited by or make application to the SARU Match Committee to join Division I. At the discretion of the Match Committee, the Club may be (a) "swapped" with a team in Division I which is not fulfilling the required standard or, perhaps, (b) added to Division I with another suitable Division II Club, thus increasing the number of Clubs in Division I may be justifiable in the future if the standard of rugby in SA does improve.

The SARU Match Committee may also consider the need for each Club in SA to nominate, prior to each season, the Division(s) and Grades in which the Club wishes to compete for the season - annual nominsation of teams by Clubs could be a useful tool for the SARU Match Committee to maintain acceptable levels of standard and competitiveness in the respective Divisions. The above requirements for Division I and Division II Clubs preclude automatic promotion/relegation of Clubs at the end of each season.

1.4 Number of Games Per Season.

The suggested Competitions for Divisions I and II allow for either 3 rounds plus finals (18 matches) or for 4 rounds plus finals (23 matches) per season. OCRFC favours 18 matches per season, recognising that this is 3 matches/season less than in 1984. The difference in the number of matches could be made up by (a) holding a mid-season 7-a-side competition (running over one or two weeks) - thus solving the recent problems associated with holding such competitions before or after the main rugby season - and by (b) arranging an extra representative match as in line with proposals in Millar's submission. Playing 3 rounds per season also allows 1 game to be played at home, 1 game away, and 1 to be played at Bailey Rugby Ground for each Club.

1.5 Venue and Times for Matches.

Similar to Millar's and Wilson's suggestions, OCRFC suggests that all Grades for each Club in each Division are played on the same ground on the same day, e.g. this means that:

- Division I Clubs have teams kicking off at, say, 12.15pm (Div. I Grade 3), 1.30pm (Div. I Grade 2) and 3.00pm (Div. I Grade 1)
- Division II Clubs have teams kicking off at, say, 1.30pm (Div. II Grade 2) and 3.00pm (Div. II Grade 1).
- Division III teams kick-off at, say, 1.30pm or 3.00pm (preferably 1.30pm to encourage support of Grade 1 teams in Divisions I and II). Playing Division III matches on different grounds from Division I and II matches may create problems with those Clubs which rely on Div. III players to be reserves or players for Div. I Grade 3 or Div. II Grade 2 teams.

Another criticism of playing all the Div. I matches for each Club on one ground may be a loss in bar trade to licensed Clubs because of a reduced number of home games. However, this purported

loss may be off-set by an expected increase in spectators at Div.I matches because of improved standard and competitiveness in the competition - the number of spectators at matches between any two of the top three or four teams in Division I last year were usually markedly higher than the numbers at other matches.

1.6 Other Comments

- 1.6.1 OCRFC does not support the suggested abolition of program booklets and players' passes (Wilson's submission.).
- 1.6.2 OCRFC does not support the proposals to play preliminary "play-off/knock out Cup Rounds" each season (Millar's & Wilson's submissions), for grading purposes.
- 1.6.3 OCRFC does not support Competition matches of any Division being played on Sundays (Millar's submission).
- 1.6.4 OCRFC does not support the suggestion that players selected for (State) training but not making themselves available unless approved by the Board do not play for a Club team when the State team is away (Herde's submission) the incentives to play for the State team should be so high as to preclude the need for such a measure.

1.7 Summary

The above suggestions are offerred to the SARU Match Committee to assist them with improving the standard of rugby in SA through the weekly competitions and through promotion of juniors. In addition continuing efforts to improve the standard are still required by improving the incentive and status for players to compete for selection in senior State teams, by improving the standard of coaching of the basic skills and spirit of the game and by striving for maximum publicity and promotion of the code.

2. SARU Development Fund.

OCRFC agrees in principle with the formation of a SARU Development Fund, especially for the purpose of improving the strength of rugby in SA. OCRFC considers that the fund must be used primarily to promote younger players during their formative years of rugby rather than older players — in particular, such promotion should be directed towards teaching both the basic skills and the spirit of the game.

2.1 Raising Monies for the SARU Development Fund

Two broad options for raising monies for the Fund are (a) for the SARU to be responsible for raising the money, either alone or in concert with the Clubs or (b) for the Clubs to raise money independently of the SARU.

OCRFC would be supportive of any reasonable methods that the SARU may wish to adopt for raising funds, but favours the second option where Clubs could be responsible for a certain contribution each year, the amount based on the number of registered senior players. Initially, each Club's contribution should probably not exceed \$5 per registered senior player per season. Each Club should be responsible for their own methods to raise the money within their Club - the most suitable methods will obviously vary between Clubs. The first contribution from each Club should not be payable until the end of the 1985 rugby season, but each Club should be informed of the contribution per player prior to the first game of the season, so that each Club can budget, accordingly. Any additional finance requested by the SARU prior to this time could financially embarrass OCRFC also believes that 1985 should be used by the SARU many Clubs. to thoroughly plan the optimum strategies for the development of rugby so that the benefits from the investment are fully realized.

In reflection :- How much have we improved?

Looking back on twenty years of Rugby I believe, except in a few isolated cases, we have not improved.

Twenty years ago Brighton (then Glenelg) were playing second grade and regularly being thrashed. A decision was made by the Club to alter that situation and direct its resources, limited as they were at the time, to the promotion of the game at junior level. The belief being that a strong junior club would one day lead to a strong senior club.

A Primary School Competition was established and Under 14, Under 16 and Under 18 teams entered in competition.

During the early sixtys the Primary Schools gave rise to an Under 14 team which won the Premiership. Numerous Junior Premierships then followed:-

These same Juniors began entering senior ranks in the early seventies. The Club won promotion to First Grade and subsequently the First Grade Premiership in 1972. Since that point Premierships have flowed in all grades, senior and junior with monotonous regularity.

Of the players to represent Brighton in First Grade Grand Finals, approximately 75% have come through the Primary School and/or Under 14 ranks.

This year's Under 14 State side contained 13 Brighton players. An appalling condemnation of the position of the game in this State.

Winning premierships is good fun, but hardly the number one priority of players. The number one priority being obviously to wear the green and gold of Australia. How many of those 13 Under 14's can realistically look forward to that possibility so long as the playing standard in this State does not improve? Good competition breeds good players.

From time to time other clubs have embraced a junior development policy with some spectacular results. $e \cdot g \cdot$

Unfortunately however, in so many cases these efforts are not sustained and the initial good work is left to wither and die.

South Australian's given the opportunity are as good as players in the Eastern State, all we need is regular, high standard competition to prove this.

The efforts of Steve Kowalick, Mike Hansel, Simon Dohety, Phil Bruce and myself in Sydney and Brisbane, must bear testimony to this point.

A high standard senior competition in this state will never ever, ever, ever be possible, until the promotion of the game at Junior level is given a high priority.

This involves a long term plan, not bandaid measures. Paying First Grade Coaches will not result in a genuine, sustained improvement in playing standard.

To this end I humbly submit the following proposals to the Administrators of Rugby in this State.

1. The Senior Competition be divided into two divisions. The first division containing eight teams and having four grades. The second division having the remaining teams and as many grades as is appropriate - possibly three.

This would allow a 21 week season with each team playing each other once at home, once away and once at Bailey.

- (a) The lowest grade in any division being played for all the reasons people all over the world play rugby, and thereby being a little less competitive, cutthroat etc., could if for example two clubs were unable to field teams then allow their opponents to get together and play a "friendly". I mean isn't that what the game is all about? Who knows some of the "old" players may even come out of retirement just to play in this grade.
- 2. All grades to be played on the same ground on the same day as is the case in both Brisbane and Sydney.

Second Grade
Third Grade
Fourth Grade

- (a) This would allow players to more easily "double up", in the case where a team is short and therefore reduce the number of forfeits.
- (b) Allow a much smoother transition of players between grades with selectors not having to rush from one ground to another to see various grades.
- (c) Prevent the present situation where third and fourth grade become almost a separate club from first and second grade, with firsts and seconds never seeing thirds and fourths play and visa versa.

- (d) Allow all of a Clubs junior teams to play at its home ground at what ever times the Junior Union decide to play.
- (e) Allow a greater efficiency of use of time, effort and finance as far as a variety of operations go. e.g. gate, canteen, bar, referees, ground marking etc.
- The top Second Division team (at the end of the minor round) play the bottom First Division team, possibly on the weekend of the elimination final with the winner playing in First Division and the loser Second Division during the following season.
- 4 To remain in First Division a Club must field (at least) the following teams by the years indicated :-

1986 Under 14

1988 Under 14 and Under 16

1990 Under 14, Under 16 and Under 18

and by 1985 have a person write an article for inclusion in the various Messenger Press Publications every week. (even if it is only the team scores). They'll print it if we submit it.

- (a) This is not to be seen as a penalty or imposition on a Club, but rather an investment in its future, and the future of rugby in this State (OUR FUTURE).
- (b) Clubs like University and Old Collegians would not be penalized by the requirement, and one needs only to look at Queensland University and Sydney University both of which field junior teams. Also Brothers and G.P.S. (Brisbane) both of which run large numbers of junior teams.
- (c) "Special" Clubs such as Roseworthy, Army, Salisbury C.A.E., Flinders University etc., who would no doubt prefer to play Second Division anyway, could still be catered for. Some of these teams may choose to fill in for lower grade, First Division teams e.g. Roseworthy might choose to play in place of Elizabeth Third Grade. A simple enough procedure.
- 5 Do away with programme booklets and players passes.
 - (a) It's a simple enough matter to circularize a fixture list to Clubs, and the time, effort and money directed toward producing the booklet could, I'm sure, be used more profitably.
 - (b) Clubs could be issued with admission tickets to the few enclosed grounds, with the players collecting their ticket at training during the preceding week. If a player fails to collect his ticket, no problem, he would pay to get in, collect his ticket from his Team Manager, take it to the gate and get a refund.

This would have the added advantage of eliminating the (occasional ?)practice of people registering as players, but with no intention of playing, simply to gain free ground admission.

Dear Mr. Peacock,

I refer to your letter of the 19th. October 1984, addressed to Mr. John Turner, Hon. Secretary of Old Collegians Cricket Club, regarding practice pitches at Tregenza Oval.

As requested in your letter, I contacted Mr. Hanning to discuss the matter, and was directed to Mr. Richard Crabb of your offices. Due to the particular requirements of our club, Mr. Crabb requested I write to the Council outlining our proposal for works to be carried out, under the headings as set out below.

BACKGROUND

Mr. John Turner (previous Club Secretary) has previously put in writing to the Council, the club's thoughts and the danger associated with the current practice nets. Those comments remain unaltered. The only addition to note, is that the Cricket Club purchased and installed wire netting over the top of the existing nets to prevent balls flying into adjacent properties. This was needed due to extensive damage to the old netting during the winter season.

The reason for not taking up your kind offer of 1983/4 year of a grant for this work, was due to Mr. Turner's previous communication to you indicating a strong need to re-position the pitches.

I understand we may re-apply for this grant if circumstances arise. The following headings were provided by Mr. Crabb.

1. LOCATION OF PRACTICE NETS

It is suggested that the practice pitches be positioned mid-way along the southern bank of the oval, with the bank as the border. The pitches to face north at right angle to the bank.

The Rugby Club Committee are aware of our proposal and are satisfied the pitches will not encroach upon the playing area of the rugby ground.

2. NUMBER OF WICKETS

Two by concrete practice pitches, as currently exists in the North-Eastern corner.

3. TYPE OF WICKET

Concrete - three-quarter length (similar to existing pitches). To be covered by an all-weather artificial turf stuck to the concrete, but only up to the batting crease (due to wear and tear). Provision for stumps at both ends of total pitch area. It was suggested a soil test be done, due to extensive dampness to the east of the proposed area.

4. FENCING

It is recommended that portable, fish net type be used. This is suggested in order to minimise damage as they would be stored at the conclusion of each practice.

Extent of netting

- 1) to cover the back (southern) end of 2 wickets.
- 2) 3 sides i.e. 2 outer sides and middle approx. 8' high; the full length of the total pitch area (i.e. further than the concrete 22yds; and the two outer sides to be at an angle of approx. 30 degrees away from the pitch.

5. CLUB CONTRIBUTION

By extending our resources, and realizing †hat we should contribute to this project, it is proposed that the Cricket Club contribute \$1,000 towards the cost - \$500 cash and \$500 interest free loan from Burnside City Council repayable over two years.

The Club is also willing to provide labour for the erection of the netting, on the understanding materials will be provided by the Council.

6. WHEN REQUIRED

Due to the danger that currently exists, we request the project be undertaken as soon as possible - if possible by early February 1985. I cannot stress too strongly, the dangers imposed by the setting sun whilst batting in the existing nets.

7. MAINTENANCE

Once installed, concrete pitches are maintenance free apart from grass mowing and the marking of the bowlers stumps line. It is proposed that the ground Curator undertake these tasks as he currently and competently does.

Whilst it is appreciated that there is a considerable cost in this proposal to the Burnside City Council, the Cricket Club has mellowed it's thoughts for turf pitches, which although highly desirable, are beyond our financial resources. We could not afford an arrangement similar to that of the Kensington District Cricket Club with your offices. However, by increasing our attempts to raise funds, we feel we can contribute the amount and effort indicated above. We see the practice pitch relocation as a top priority for the Club, as player safety and harmonious relationships with adjoining private properties far outweighs the monetary considerations.

Trusting the above meets with your requirements and I await your early and favourably response.
