FROM THE TOUCHLINE.

A comfortable victory over North Adelaide last week was a timely fillip for the First XV and augurs well for this week's match against Elizabeth. Providing we don't give away silly penalties, and if our defence stands up to strong opposition, I would expect a clear win in this important game.

Last week's match was played with a strong, biting, chilly wind blowingacross ground which grossly hampered players. Nevertheless it wasn't long after the kick-off that Collegians scored their first try. Jim G'Sullivan crossed the line and Coulson converted. We expected Collegians to pile on the points after this, but North held us for quite some time, aided in part by some mishandling by our players who also found difficulty in directing some of their kicks. The opposition had kicked a penalty goal before Andrew Davidson grounded the ball for our second try, and the former later scored their try. Jim O'Sullivan again broke through before half time to culminate a good rush by several players and scored another try, duly converted by Coulson.

Although North were being outplayed they kept on trying. They had two or three dangerous players who proved to be able to keep their team on their foes. Collegians tackling was better this week, but there were still players not pulling their full weight in this facet. I'd like to see every player tackle as well as some already do. In the second half Andrew Davidson produced a piece of good play in gaining ground for the team, before Greg Jacobs took the ball and ran on to score near the posts. Greg Coulson kicked his third conversion goal and later kicked a penalty goal. To wind up the scoring Bob Hillar kicked a field goal (a beauty).

Because Collegians played more like a team in this match there were many good players. The Selectors certainly haven't an easy task in picking the team to play Elizabeth this week. Greg Jacobs played very well, tackled determinedly, and showed several times that he is a good opportunist. Bob Millar answered his critics with a sound game. Wingers Peter Snook and Andrew Davidson again played impressively, and Jim O'Sullivan until his retirement showed good promise of a good comeback. Jim Press and Quinn played solidly and I liked Duncan Leslie's game too - I reckson there might be more to come from him. Rod Hauser is cortainly proving his versatility - always a busy player.
