LAUNCH OF RUGBY 2003

John O'Neill, Managing Director/CEO of ARU, launched Rugby 2003 on 21 February. To follow are some (edited) highlights of his speech.

Rugby 2003 will be a celebration, the biggest and greatest year in Australia's rugby history. Australian Rugby is setting off on a journey this year that will change the game forever in this country. The sporting landscape will change. Right here and now, the ARU has five clear objectives in this defining year for our game: win Rugby World Cup 2003, host the "Best Ever" tournament, optimise the legacies for Rugby in Australia and globally after RWC 2003, maintain and enhance the "Underlying business" and continue momentum on our major strategic priorities e.g. a 4th Super 12 team.

Which brings us to the year ahead. What a repertoire! 69 games of Vodafone Super 12, three inbound Tests against England, Ireland and Wales, the Tri Nations Series – all part of the Bundaberg Rum Rugby Series, and then the jewel in the crown, the fifth Rugby World Cup – 48 games of Test match Rugby here in Australia.

If Rugby has a "good news" story to tell, the first chapter is Super 12. Season ticket sales have tripled for the Waratahs and doubled for the Reds. Rugby Tests now attract more television viewers in Melbourne than they do in Brisbane.

Australians have bought close to a million tickets to the Rugby World Cup, which is still eight months away. We are confident that more than two million people will pass through the turnstiles compared with the 600,000 who attended in 1987. The worldwide TV audience will have grown from a humble 300 million to a projected 4 billion across the tournament. More than 200 countries are taking the telecasts. 20 teams, 48 games, ten cities, 55,000 visitors, maybe more, a world-wide TV audience of 4 billion across the Tournament, an economic impact of one billion dollars – these are just figures to us today. In eight months time we will all be living the reality of those figures. Our cities will be coming alive with festive events, live sites, concerts and other special events – a whole raft of things that will add to the celebration. We are exploring every possible angle to deliver the party of a lifetime.

That's the year ahead for us. As I said, it is a defining year for Australian Rugby.

WORLD CUP REPECHAGE

On Saturday 15 March, Tonga trounced South Korea by 75-0 in the first of two répechage matches to determine which of the two will play at the Rugby World Cup later this year. The next game is on 22 March, but given the result of this first game, Tonga seems a safe bet. On the same day, Spain beat Tunisia 33-16 and are thus a step closer to qualifying. The final scores were particularly surprising, given that Tunisia were ahead 13-3 at half-time. It was only in the last 13 minutes that Spain drew ahead. Spain now goes on to meet the USA in two games in April to decide which of the two will play in the World Cup.

RUGBY SEASON 2003

ELIZABETH SEVENS

We came we saw and we were conquered! Ray Butler, our sevens coach, was heard to mutter in an inspirational way "Damn ... that was good". On the positive side the guys went through to the Plate competition and the girls got to their final. It did give us an opportunity to look at some of our new players and players coming back after several years away.

The men's team, made up mainly of front rowers and outside backs, showed some turns of speed that clearly indicated summer has not all been downhill. Our Foreign Legion of Kiwi, Pom, French and Argentinean members contributed well as did our long lost friends MacDougal and Wells. Unfortunately not all could stay the whole day and left a hole for the business end of the day.

Early season games have a tendency to bring with them the likelihood of injuries. The Injury God arrived, looked round and asked "Where's Stew? Never mind we can do our bit with this lot. "He did. A few hammy's tweaked, a few sore muscles and at least one hard bang in the head. Mike and Kate, as reliable as ever, had a full day's work. Ben Hamer was heard to say "I thought that was why you played rugby". That boy has a mind of his own.

The Frocs turned up with 16 girls, which was a phenomenal turnout for a team that normally only scrapes together eight or nine for a game of sevens. Unfortunately, they were only allowed to name a squad of 12, so four of the veterans chose to sit out the day and give the new blood a chance to stretch their legs. The gals won the first game against Port Adelaide convincingly, but unfortunately faired less well against the more disciplined Southern Suburbs girls who consistently broke tackles and forced them to commit too many to the ruck. The final results notwithstanding, there were very good performances by many girls. In particular, the "new girls" Sally (ex of Burnside), Alicia and Tara have now all played their first game for the Frocs. Kudos to Kate Reynolds, who was declared 'best on ground' for the Frocs.





The season is onto us again and pre-season training has started. We currently have an attendance of about 1.5 teams of males and about 1.5 teams of females. If we are going to succeed in entering four men's teams and one women's team this year, we will need more men. [Ed: Here, here]. So ring your mates and get them out.

- Trial game against Woodville at Woodville on 22 March. Mixed team with rotations.
- Team squads to be picked following trial and will be notified Tuesday 25th.
- First round on 5th April at Brighton.
- No play over Easter

For the trial we would like all players to play who wish to be considered for 1st and 2nd grades. If you can't make it please let Neil Bradley, Bob Stafford-Lee or Ted Apted know.

There will be changes to the competition this year. The 1st and 2nd Grades will each have eight teams, each with promotion relegation. To be in 1st Grade you will no longer need a team in 2nd Grade. For home games this will cause no problems, but for away games 1st and 2nd could be playing at different grounds. That together with a new rule covering substituted players, may mean only limited backing up can be allowed without jeopardising a player's status for the finals

The form of competition is not totally finalised, but appears to be three complete rounds of 21 games and no byes. There will be no mid season cup during the Australian Rugby Shield. Minor round games will continue which may make final places a bit of a lottery. Finals will be made up of top four teams in each grade and played over three weeks. The Grand Finals will be in late September.

The 3rd and 4th Grade competitions are still being developed, but it is likely that the 3rd s will play at the same ground with the 1st s. We have entered both 3rd and 4th Grades and look forward to strong success after last year's efforts. Numbers of teams in each competition is still being sorted out. The women's competition is also still being sorted out, but we know it will begin in the first week of May, with four teams and (hopefully) 15 a side.

If you want to play this year come along to practice and let us know. Make sure you bring a friend, male or female - we are broad-minded and don't mind.




